• the ultimate *patch pockets* fashion vocabulary •



_patch pocket

Patch pockets are stitched onto the outside of garment.



_regular dress

Patch pocket ending with a pointed shape. Often it presents stitching.



_regular sport

Patch pocket with a rounded lower edge.



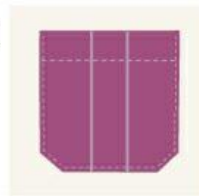
_classic

Patch pocket with an angular lower edge.



_inverted pleat

A patch pocket with a inverted pleat. The pleat can remain open or can be closed with a stitch.



_box pleat

A patch pocket with a box pleat to create more space within the pocket. The pleat can remain open or it can be sealed with a stitch.



_classic flap

A patch pocket with a bagged out flap, with the same width of the patch and stitched above it to cover the opening. It is finished with a button or stud fastening.



_regular dress flap

A regular dress pocket with a flap.



_box pleat flap

Flap pocket with a bagged out shape.



_cargo pocket

Patch pocket with a pleat behind it that expands to accommodate more place within it. Applied to work jackets and coats.



_safari pocket

Patch pocket with a box pleat. The pleat continues on the flap, which is closed by a button.



_saddle pocket

Pocket with flap fastened by a belt.

—no pocket

Jeans with no back pockets are generally regarded as no-no.



—traditional

Rear patch pocket attached to exterior of pants. It ends to a point and has decorative stitching.



—carpenter

Multi-pocket jeans. It's used in carpenter/cargo styles.



—embellished

Fashion, embellished, decorated pockets.



—flap with bottom

Back flap pocket with snap closure



—oval pocket

Rear oval patch pocket.



—flap with belt

Flap patch pocket that allows for expansion from a pleat in the center.



—slit with zipper

Rear pocket with zipped closure.



—traditional 5 pocket

This is the most widely used pocket configuration, with the fifth pocket being the small coin pocket.



—stitched round pocket

Frontal round pockets with stitching.



—seamed

Pocket in inside pants, opening finished with a seam.



—diagonal with zipped

Diagonal pockets with a small pocket inside a larger pocket with zipped closure.



—patch zipped pocket

Frontal patch pocket with zipped closure.



—patch with diagonal opening

Frontal patch pocket with diagonal opening.



—rectangular patch pocket

Front rectangular patch pocket, it's attached to the exterior of the pants.



—embellished pocket

Jeans embellished with matte buttons and metallic stitching.

_bound pocket

Slash pocket with both edges of opening finished with binding. It is also called buttonhole, besom or double welt pocket.



_welt pocket with button

Pocket with one or two bindings and a button just under the opening to keep it closed. The buttonhole is sewed on the fabric of the item.



_welt pocket with tab

Slash pocket with a double binding from which a buttonhole comes out to tie to a button placed just under the opening.



_classic

Slash pocket with a rectangular piece of fabric that lifts from the opening and is sewed on the edges to block it.



_welt pocket with zip

Slash pocket with a double binding and a zip in the middle of the opening.



_welt pocket with flap

Welt pocket with a piece of fabric that hangs down over the pocket opening.



_smiley pocket

Curved bound pocket used on western shirt. May be reinforced at the ends with embroidered arrows.



_chino pocket

Front hip pocket forms a straight line from the waistline to the side seam.



_continental pocket

Front hip pocket formed by an angle that starts from waistline and ends on the side seam.



_western pocket

Front hip pocket forms a curve from the waistline to the side seam.



_ticket pocket

Small patch pocket sewn inside a large pocket to hold ticket, keys or coins.



_denim jacket pocket

Welt pocket with flap fastened with a button. It looks like a patch pocket thanks to a stitching that simulates the shape of the pocket.

—standard
4 dart

a dart starts from below the armpit and ends on the breast; the other starts from below the breast and ends at the end of the chest.



—french dart

transversal dart that starts on the side and ends nearby the breast.



—armseye
darts

short dart that starts below the armpit and ends nearby the breast.



—armseye
princess seams

dart with a rounded cut, it starts by the armpit, passes through the breast and ends at the end of the chest.



—center front
seam parts

characterized by a geometric cut: a dart vertically cuts the chest in the middle, another dart starts from the center and moves towards the breast shaping a "V".



—H dart
princess

formed by two darts, one starts from the shoulder and ends on the breast; the other one starts from the end of the chest and ends below the breast. They shape an "H" cut.



—princess
styleline

two darts that vertically cuts the whole chest on the two sides.



—princess
seams

dart composed by a rounded cut and a diagonal cut that starts nearby the breast.



—waist dart

dart that starts on the waist, it starts from the waist and ends below the breast.



—double
waist dart

double dart on the waist; from the end of the chest it opens up till the breast, shaping a "V".
